RULES TO BE OBSERVED

15 miles per hour in business section.
20 miles per hour in residential section.

Stop Signs are there for a purpose.

Complete stop on Red Light.

No U Turns at Business Intersection.

Slow down for pedestrians.

Do not pass car on curve or hill.

Keep within parking lanes.

Use extra precaution when children are dismissed from school.

Report all accidents at once.

Avoid splashing mud and water on pedestrians.

When you blow your horn for pedestrians, shut off the gas, so you will have your car under control, as you do not know what direction some will go.

Avoid double parking.

Avoid parking near Fire Hydrants.

When you see or hear Fire Truck pull to the curb.

Always signal before making turn.

Do not be a Road Hog.

Do not park in prohibited district.

Make sure you have two head lights.

Make sure your rear light is O. K.

Always obey Traffic Signals.

Do not allow motor to run unattended.

Make sure your Operator's License does not expire.

Do not park in front of Theater.

Do not park in a Driveway.

Traffic emergencies await you — a human life may depend upon you having your car under control at all times.

If you have any bad habits which would be a detriment to safe driving, keep away from the wheel. Remember, death is permanent.

The Law permits us to make an arrest for these violations, but we do not propose to do that in all cases.

May we instead, call your attention to the growing toll of deaths and serious

injuries as the result of traffic accidents and we ask you to help the authorities in their effort to control this situation.

You as an automobile driver, can do much to aid in this campaign by close observance of the regulations yourself and by encouraging others in similar observance.
